It seems like after years of exile living among people who had different cultures, customs, and morals they had become more like the people around them than God's people and Zerubbabel, Zechariah, Haggai, Ezra, Nehemiah and the other priests, prophets, and leaders are trying to establish a completely counter-cultural way of living and completely change the way people think. This is a big task and perhaps many people didn't realize how ungodly their behavior was.
