## A.L.I.V.E. Bible Study Wednesday, October 7, 2020 Nehemiah 6:1-14

- 1. What happened in Sunday's Bible Study on Nehemiah 5?
  - a. The Jews were struggling financially during a famine and the governors were charging high taxes on people who were already struggling.
