"Hope does not exist in a vacuum. It is not rootless optimism, unfounded yearning, or ungrounded wishing. Authentic hope comes from God. It is based on His nature and promises.

Amos chapter 9 gives us a basis of lasting hope. As you scan the chapter, you may think I am referring to the last five verses on the five promises of restoration of Israel. Not so. The entire chapter animates hope. We behold God who makes and keeps His promises. He follows through on His promises of judgment as well as His subsequent promises of a new beginning. His righteousness and grace are inseparable. God is absolutely reliable in both. Because He is, we have a solid source of profound hope." – The Communicators Commentary, Vol 20. (p. 352)

1.	What does Amos see in 9:1?	

- 2. What does the Lord say to Amos in 9:1-6?
 - a. Strike the tops of the pillars...bring them down on the head of the people; those who are left I will kill with the sword.
 - b. I will keep my eye on them for harm and not for good.

 - d. There will be fruit among the people in the new nation that I build up.
