- 1. Paul says in 3:1, "For this reason I...." What is the reason that he does what he does?
 - a. Because Christ died to bring those who were dead in their transgressions and sins (in which we used to live) to new life.
 - b. Because Christ took those who did not deserve salvation and turned them around to do the good works that were prepared in advance for them to do.
 - c. Because Christ reconciled Jew and Gentile, insiders and outsiders, into one people by faith in Him.
 - d. All that stuff from chapter 2.
- 2. What does Paul do?
 - a. I don't know, he kind of stops in the middle of the sentence and starts talking about something else (maybe this is where Pastor Pete learned to do that).
 - b. Uh...maybe that is why he has become an apostle...that's what he says "I became" in verse 7...but this also still might be the thing he stopped to tell us in the middle.
 - c. Verse 14 seems to continue the sentence by telling us that he kneels before the father and prays for God to strengthen us with power through his Spirit!
- 3. What does Paul stop in the middle of his sentence to remind his readers, according to verses 2-13?
 - a. About the administration of God's grace that was given to him for them.
 - b. That God gave him the revelation of the mystery His grace to the Gentiles.
 - c. He is reminding us of the reason that he is a prisoner.
 - d. He wants them to know that God's revelation to him was not because of his own worthiness, but because of God's grace to him.
 - e. He seems to explain how he came to be a prisoner of Christ and what it means that he is one for the sake of the Gentiles.
 - f. He stops because he realizes that reminding them of his imprisonment might not be an encouraging message, so he wants them to know that it is all worth it because of the freedom that he, along with those to whom he has preached the message, are now able to experience.
