- 5. Paul refers to this text in 2 Corinthias 3:7-18. Before I studied this, I believed that they covered Moses's face because the people were so afraid. However, sometimes the way we learn best how to interpret scripture is by reading how the church leaders, themselves, interpreted scripture. What does Paul say about the glory of God on Moses's face (see verses 7 & 13).
- 6. How does Paul apply this text from a New Testament Perspective?
 - a. He is describing the superiority of God's new covenant with His people to the Old one.
 - b. He is noting that the Glory of God was present in the Old Covenant, which is why Moses' face shone.
 - c. He points out that by the presence of God's Spirit, the glory does not have to fade.
 - d. The veil becomes a metaphor for our need to hide the fading glory of God...and he says we should no longer need veils because the glory no longer needs to fade because we can now, finally, dwell in the presence of God by His Spirit.
