1.	How does Jeremiah begin this text in the beginning of 12:1?
2.	What problem does Jeremiah have with God's justice in this case, according to the second part of 12:1 through 12:4?

- 3. Who is Jeremiah worried about in this complaint?
  - a. All the lost people in the nations surrounding Israel and Judah.
  - b. The people of Judah who were plotting against him even though he is only doing the will of God.
- 4. Have you ever complained to God about God's justice?
  - a. Yes, life doesn't seem fair.
  - b. No, I'm really spiritual and I don't care if it's fair.
- 5. How did God respond to Jeremiah's prayers, according to 12:5-13?
  - a. God didn't respond to Jeremiah's stupid whiney complaints.
  - b. God responded directly. He hears our cries, even when we are struggling to understand his ways.
  - c. God noted that struggling with easy things is a sure sign that you won't last when things get hard.
  - d. He assured Jeremiah that he knew what was going on.
  - e. He pronounced judgment on the people.
  - f. God is just and just because we don't see his justice doesn't mean that he doesn't have things under control.
