- 1. What does Jeremiah say to the Lord in verse 16:19?
  - a. He calls Him his fortress and refuge in time of distress.
  - b. He says that the nations will come and confess their idolatry.
  - c. He says that people will begin to understand that the idols that their ancestors worshipped were false gods and worthless and did them no good.
- 2. How does God say that he will respond to the people who look to other sources of salvation than Him, according to 16:21?\_\_\_\_\_
- 3. What does Jeremiah mean in verse 17:1-2 when he talks about the sin of Judah?
  - a. Sin is not easily forgotten.
  - b. Judah's sin is represented by all of the other places that they have turned for help.
  - c. Turning to places other than God for help is seen by our children and passed on.
- 4. How, according to verses 17:3-4, will God respond to this idolatry?
  - a. He will give away their wealth and land as plunder.
  - b. What God has given, will be given to others "through [their] own fault."
  - c. They will be enslaved by their enemies.
  - d. God is angry.
- 5. What does this passage tell us about idolatry, according to 17:5-6?
  - a. Cursed is the one who trusts in man.
