What does God tell Jeremiah to do in 35:2?
 Who were the Rekabites? a. UhI don't know. b. The descendants of Rekab? c. Descendants of Jehonadab, who helped Jehu strike down the prophets of Baal (2 Kings 10:15-27).
Why, in verses 2-5, did God tell Jeremiah to offer them wine?a. Because all the cool kids were doing it.b. Maybe he just wanted to be a good host.c. Well, according to verse 6, this was a group of people who didn't drink wine and hadn't for generations.
